<u>Bus Service 59 on Saturdays</u> <u>Grafty Green - Maidstone via Ulcombe and Kingswood</u>

Good news! The Saturday service is to continue beyond the end of March with Kent County Council funding a contract for its continued operation. The operator on Saturdays from 8th April will be Nu-Venture rather than Arriva, but the timetable for Grafty Green will be very similar to the present one. Full details next month.

In the meantime, Arriva will continue to provide the Saturday service up to April 1st, and the £2-50 fare offer is also continuing up to that date. (There was apparently a problem on a couple of weekends in February which meant that drivers were unable to issue the lower fares but I am assured that this has now been put right by Arriva).

The above only applies to Saturdays - the Monday to Friday service will continue as now and will also continue to be operated by Arriva.

Grafty Garden Cuttings – March

Spring seems to be arriving later this year, but at last the yellows of the aconites, primroses and daffodils are brightening our days, whether the sun shines or not.

The rain that has been falling gently all day will help to bring up a water table that is at least a metre lower than it should be at this time of year, but it will require much more before the reservoirs start to fill. Everything in the garden seems to have grown overnight and the insects are out in force, which the birds love. Their songs filled the air this morning and the Goldcrests are back in the Norway spruce, busily eating all they can find.

Jobs for the month include: complete the pruning of roses, buddleias, and large flowered clematis and the clearing of the dead stems of perennials. Also tidy away any leaves that have refused to rot over winter and continued to fly around the garden to heap themselves in odd corners.

Tomatoes, leeks, celery, cucumbers, herbs, melons and capsicums (sweet peppers), can all be sown in a heated glasshouse. Early potatoes should have been 'chitted' and now have compact green shoots, ready for planting out at the end of the month, provided the ground is warm enough. Likewise parsnip seed and onion sets can go in but if the ground is too cold, delay sowing. It is far better to sow later than have everything rot and crops will soon catch up. Beetroot, carrots, broad beans, sprouts, turnips, peas and radish can all be sown under cloches.

This is a good time to do a garden makeover. We are tidying up at the front of our cottage, taking out old stakes and a hedge that really does not deserve the name. The old penny that came up with the roots is dated 1889, so we feel that it is about time we did do something. I am also taking out Nerine Bowdenii and Japanese anemone, each a victim of their own success in that they were

smothering out themselves and each other. The book says clumps of Nerine need separating every 5 years or so, but as they can sulk for two or three years before blooming again, I think I would leave them longer than that. They can be planted with their noses above ground, almost anywhere but very dry or very wet would not suit. Their pink blooms in autumn are a joy, but if cut for indoors, their perfume is terrible, as I discovered years ago when I took a bunch to someone in hospital and wondered why they were less than thrilled to receive them!!



IMPORTANT NOTICE



There is a total hosepipe ban in place until further notice for all domestic customers.

On average, we each use 165 litres of water every day for all our domestic needs:

Flushing the toilet	=	45 litres (7-10 litres per flush)
Personal washing and bathing	=	50 litres
Drinking/cooking	=	15 litres
Laundry	=	25 litres
Cleaning/dishwashing	=	20 litres
Garden watering/washing cars	=	10 litres

On average, we each use 165 litres of water every day for all our domestic needs.

Join us in a partnership to help save water - small changes to your daily routine can result in big savings

Here are a few simple ways you can save water in the home and garden:

- Don't leave the tap running when you brush you teeth. A family of four could save a bathful of water a day.
- Fix any dripping taps. A dripping tap can waste
 25 litres of water a day.
- Take a shower instead of a bath. The average shower uses 30 litres of water but a bath uses 80 litres.
- Don't clean and peel vegetables under a running tap. A tap left running for 10 minutes uses nearly 100 litres of water.
- Make sure you have a full load for your washing machine/dishwasher rather than a half load. Each cycle of a machine uses up to 100 litres of water.

- Fit a water butt in the garden to collect rain water. Plants prefer rain water.
- There is no need to water well established trees and shrubs. They are generally drought proof, with a searching root system that will extract water from deep in the soil.
- Water directly around the roots of plants. Watering the leaves is wasteful as a high proportion evaporates.
- Don't water in the heat of the day. The water will evaporate before it reaches the roots. The best time to water is late afternoon or evening.

Grafty Green Heating Oil Club

Most of you are probably aware that Grafty Green has an Oil Club. We now have about 70 members all benefiting from cheaper domestic heating oil. I have extended the boundary to cover Lenham, Sandway, Platts Heath, Liverton Hill, Ulcombe, and East Sutton.

Having oil delivered in bulk benefits everyone including the environment, not so many heavy noisy tankers clogging up our roads and the countryside.

To make the club work we all need to at least top up with the minimum 500 Litres or more at the same time, giving us maximum discount. It's easy, theoretically the more oil I order the more money we save. At the beginning of January the supplier delivered nearly 50,000 Litres and that was only about 35 members participating, 40 or 50 needing oil would have pushed the price even further down. Generally we save around 3 to 4p per Litre. So if you think it's for you please email me at europa.13@btinternet.com or telephone 858350. The Oil Club is non-profit making.

Harrietsham Family History Group

On Monday 27th March 2006 a trip to the Family Record Centre in London has been arranged.

At the centre you view census returns from 1841 to 1901 (ten year intervals), Indexes of birth, marriage and death from July 1837 to 2004, and wills prior to 1858.

Nearby (five minutes walk) at The London Metropolitan Archives you can see the records of many London Churches, including baptisms, marriages and burials. Also available are many records of Local Councils, covering school admissions and workhouse records.

St Edmunds Centre Platts Heath

Just to bring all our readers up to date with our efforts for our community hall.

We are at present negotiating a lease from the church. This is required of us before the Maidstone Borough Council and the Kent County Council will make any grant towards the refurbishment of the St Edmunds Hall.

During 2005 we applied for Trust status and were granted it in September. This also assists with applying for grant money.

Our application to the Hatch Charity was successful and they have pledged the most generous sum of £2,000. The Lenham Parish Council have also pledged £2,500. The Maidstone Borough Council have agreed a grant of £11,865 provided the Kent County Council agree to grant double that sum and also provided we produce a signed lease.

We have also applied to the Awards for All lottery scheme and hope to hear from them by the end of February.

When we had the survey carried out the building was declared sound. However it does need considerable repair work done and Twenty-First Century amenities. The architect has made some plans and the builders quotes came in. The overall cost of the project will be £48,000.

This will provide a disabled access ramp to the front of the building and a fire exit with disabled access to the rear of the building as well as a toilet with disabled access and a kitchen - we do have a cold water supply and sink at present. To combat the damp which has been quite a problem in recent years there will be a damp course put in and the rotten windows will be replaced or repaired and painted depending on what each needs.

If we can raise enough funds it has been recommended by the architect we install storage heaters which would keep an ambient temperature during the winter months. The walls are very thick and therefore like all churches hold the cold and create condensation with the existing wall mounted electric fires.

Any villagers who can offer either their skilled work i.e:- Electrician, plumber, plasterer and painter or a donation, it would be very much appreciated. We are all working to provide this village and its school with a pleasant little hall which can be used for a variety of purposes and a sense of community. Somewhere that friends can meet and enjoy one another's company.
