

#### **Grafty Garden Cuttings – November**

We recently spent a few days in Gloucester, where we visited the Malvern Autumn Show, something I have long wanted to do. Though similar to the Detling show, with animals and the usual bags, hats, boots and other sundry items for sale, also included were show gardens, crafts and lots of nursery stands with masses of must-have plants. This meant we carried a garden around in the car for a week, but we all survived. For us, the highlight of the show, however, was the Harvest tent, which really took us back in time, with its wonderful and beautiful displays of flowers, fruit and vegetables. The competition for the largest pumpkin, marrow, leeks, onions etc, was a real eye opener! The two largest cabbages filled a table on their own, the largest marrow was over six feet (2 Metres) long and the largest pumpkin came in at 349.5 lbs, or more than 6 sacks of potatoes. Fork-lift trucks required. The setting, at the base of the Malvern Hills was wonderful too.

Our trip also included a visit to the WWT site at Slimbridge. We did our own little Autumn Watch, looking at the first of the thousands of Hooper swans and geese that come to winter there, and the fact that the site also includes the all important and brand new visitor centre facilities, with an excellent restaurant, really made the day.

Here, we have seen a pair of nuthatches for the first time in years, there is still a good population of tits, but the blackbirds and thrushes seem to have gone fly about, leaving us with a huge supply of grapes on the vine in the mulberry tree. Ladder needed to harvest these, wresting them from the giant wasps, which become quite drunk by the end of the day. The grapes go through the juicer, no sugar required for a refreshing drink, or with gelatine added for a fruity, table jelly. We are not wine drinkers, so have not tried making that yet.

The rain has spurred the gardens to a late rush of growth, so lawns can continue to be mown on a higher setting until frosts really set in, when all this greenery and lush growth will also need clearing. Leaving the autumn tidy-up to spring is the wildlife friendly option of course. I shall clear leaves from the lawns and alpine beds, but will let those left around the boarders stay to protect insects. Rotting leaves in fish ponds are not a good idea, so these should be carefully raked out, or a fine net used, to keep them out in the first place. In the wildlife

pond, the newts and other pond creatures seem to like to hide in the murk at the bottom, so I only clear that out every 4 or 5 years.

Sweet peas, garlic and autumn onion sets should be in and shooting so still plenty to do.

The following is an e-mail message receiver by Pat Anderson – Clerk to Boughton Malherbe Parish Council, concerning the status of the leaks on Liverton Hill:

Pat.

As you may be aware I sorted the water problem outside of Ivy House Farm, however it appears that another spring has appeared further down the hill just after the double bends. Dennis Gower and I investigated on Monday and we have a rough idea of where the possible spring is within the carriageway. For me to carry out the remedial works safety I am going to have to put an emergency road closure on Liverton Hill. I am in the process of arranging this closure and hope to start the works before the weather turns bad.

Grafty Green has a successful Heating Oil Club. We have to date nearly 100 members all taking advantage of cheaper heating oil when ordered in bulk. To make this club work all members have to have at least the minimum 500 Litres every time we order, that is about 3 to 4 times a year. It makes sense to have a bulk order delivered over 2 to 3 days every 4 months, rather than have tankers clogging up our village every week.

We now cover Harrietsham, Headcorn, Lenham, Liverton Hill, Platts Heath, Sandway Ulcombe and Biddenden. #### INDEPENDENCE FOR THE FUTURE

BibleLands supports Project Partners involved in providing degree-level Nurse Training as well as vocational training and rehabilitation facilities for young people.

Promoting and resourcing vocational and adult training remains one of BibleLands key areas of ministry. For individuals and communities caught in the poverty trap, vocational training can provide an opportunity to gain independence, self-sufficiency and a way of building for the future.

Think and Do provides a wide variety of training courses for young people in Cairo and the surrounding rural areas. £10,000 from BibleLands has provided ten training places.

£6700 has been sent to the Al Kafa'at Foundation in Beirut to fund new equipment in the Village where adults with disabilities work together in a sheltered environment, developing their manual and communication skills as a means of achieving some level of independence.

£2500 enables the **Bethlehem Bible College** to hold its annual summer camp, which provides a range of activities for Palestinian children between the ages of 5 and 13.

Following an overwhelmingly generous response from supporters to the BibleLands 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Appeal the first instalment of £118,870 towards a

final total of £330,000 has been sent to the development of the new Nazareth School of Nursing building.

The total Vocational and Adult Training Programme support totalled £496,145
